Fenton News

The Trust had a very busy year in 2013-14. During this year we received the funds from the generous bequest made by Alastair Graham-Bryce, and TFAT was able to increase the funds it could make available for distribution as grants by approximately £10,000 per year. In all, the Trust gave £108,763 in grants to 29 different artists and organisations – almost £24,000 more than in 2012-2013. We welcomed two new members to the board of Trustees: Paul Bayley and Gregor Logan, both of whom have had an association with the Trust for some time.



◀ **Paul Bayley** is Director of the Florence Trust, a past TFAT beneficiary. His career in the contemporary visual arts covers a wide variety of different roles, including curator, catalogue writer and collaborator, and he has experience of working with both small charities and national museums. He sits on the Arts Committee of St Pauls Cathedral, and is a member of

the board of the Methodist Modern Art Collection. In particular, his experience of fostering artists at the beginning of their careers means that he can offer the Trustees valuable insights when considering applications from the fine arts.



◀ **Gregor Logan** has been informally involved with the Trust for some time now, via his wife Sue Logan, who held the post of Hon. Treasurer from 2000 to 2005. Gregor's career as an investment practitioner has covered both the corporate and charity sectors, and his role as advisor to the Benevolent Fund of the ISM (Incorporated Society of Musicians) means he can offer invaluable advice

and support to the Trust to help ensure it protects its capital to allow it to continue its grant-making work. (photo: Reuters)

Scholarships and Bursaries: a change in Trust policy

The Trust has recently reviewed its policies, and now wishes to focus more specifically on those who have already made a professional entry into the arts. Consequently attention will shift away from those who are still seeking that entry. It is hoped that colleges, academies, universities *et cetera* may be able to propose alternatives to bursaries with blanket applicability to a wide range of students, and will be more focused on those who are making a career in the arts rather than on the basis of hardship alone.

The Poetry Trust

In November 2013 - the second year of the Trust's sponsorship - The Fenton Aldeburgh First Collection Prize was given to Dan O'Brien for his first book of poetry, *War Reporter*.

“At the opening of the 25th Aldeburgh Poetry Festival I had the double pleasure of announcing the winner of the 2013 Fenton Aldeburgh First Collection Prize and introducing last year's winner Olivia McCannon to deliver the 'reading' part of her prize.

“From a record total of 83 entries in 2013, the three judges Peter Blegvad, Maura Dooley and Robert Seatter unanimously chose Dan O'Brien for *War Reporter*. The 120 page sequence of poems – the result of a collaboration with Pulitzer Prize-winning war reporter Paul Watson and his experiences in Mogadishu, Rwanda, Afghanistan and Syria – is quite simply essential reading.



"With the generous funding given by The Fenton Arts Trust we were able to establish an 'Alumni Production Scheme Fund'. Despite the fact that film making can be a very slow process, we were delighted to discover that projects we supported have already had an amazing amount of public success.

"Thanks to Fenton support, the production team of the short film Border Patrol – Peter Baumann, Director, Simon Bolton-Gabrielson and Nishad Chaughule Producers, Justin Litton, Director of Photography and James Gover, Editor - were able to attend the Student Academy Awards at the Directors' Guild of America. The team travelled to LA to receive the award and had the opportunity to meet and network with professionals at the top of the industry. The Trust's support went a long way to enabling them to take advantage of this one-off opportunity, and the extra funds particularly made a difference for James, who has been diagnosed with cerebral palsy and had to travel with his full-time carer, a significant further cost."

"The Fenton grant also supported Ashleigh Spindle and Nuno Rodriguez to work on the short film Safiyah Flies Across the Ocean. The film will be screened at the BFI Futures Fest in February 2015.

"Gold, a short film by writer/director Cleo Samoles-Little, had raised enough money for production but had no funding left to enter film festivals. TFAT funding has enabled the film to be entered widely into festivals this year, and already the film has been accepted into the London Short Film Festival and Underwire.

"Finally Creative Producing Elevator beneficiaries Aurora Fearnley and Ron Wright are developing the work they brought to the scheme, and Aurora has also become the mentee of both Franc Roddam, Director of Quadrophenia and Robert Grant, Director of the London Sci-fi Film Festival."
